#### **Korean War**

The United States fought in the Korean War from 1950 – 1953.



### **Cold War**

At the same time that the United States fought in the Korean War, we were at the beginning of the Cold War with the Soviet Union.

During a cold war there are there are tensions between countries, and countries may make threats about going to war, but there are not any actual battles that are fought between soldiers.

**During the Cold War** with the Soviet Union, **the main concern of the United States was communism.**

# **Capitalism and Communism**

**The United States has a capitalist economic system.** The Soviet Union was a communist country.

11. What is the economic system in the United States?

The Cold War was a competition between capitalism and communism.

### North and South Korea



In Korea, the <u>north</u> part of the country was communist, and the <u>south</u> part of the country was capitalist.

The United States sent soldiers to fight in the Korean War to stop the southern part of the country from becoming communist.

Fighting in the Korean War stopped in 1953. Since the end of the Korean War, North Korea and South Korea have been two separate countries.

# **President Dwight D. Eisenhower**

Dwight D. Eisenhower was <u>President</u> of the United States when fighting in the Korean War ended. **Before he was President, Dwight D. Eisenhower was a general during World War II.**

The Korean War Veterans Memorial was open to the public in 1995. There are blocks in the memorial that say that 54,246 <u>U.S.</u> soldiers died during the Korean War. 103,284 U.S. soldiers were wounded, 7,140 were captured, and 8,177 are missing.
