

White heroin, a drug more potent, more pure and more expensive when cut than Mexican brown heroin, has begun appearing in Chicago for the first time in three years. Its sudden appearance here has caused deep concern among local and federal lawmen. The deadlier white drug has been "trickling" into Chicago the last three months from Asia and the Middle East. Informants have told lawmen they believe that at least the transportation of the drug is financed by the Chicago crime syndicate.

Urge effort to find ex-Nazis

WASHINGTON — Rep. Joshua Eilberg (R-Pa.) accused the Justice Department on Monday of not pursuing evidence that alleged Nazi war criminals are residing in the United States.

"I am extremely disturbed that the Immigration and Naturalization Service is not expediting the investigation of leads and testimony of witnesses supplied by the Israeli Nazi War Criminal Office," said Eilberg. "Time is certainly of the essence," he said. "I believe that everything possible should be done immediately to bring the proper charges against the alleged Nazi criminals."

Eilberg, chairman of the House subcommittee on immigration, citizenship, and international law, met recently with Maj. Gershon Lengsfelder, chief of investigation in the Nazi War Criminal Office of Israel. Eilberg said the Immigration service has 53 names in its file of persons accused of war crimes during World Wur II. Lengsfelder supplied the names of some 40 witnesses for 27 cases, and leads in 10 other cases, Eilberg said.

Mistaken identity gives Anne Wanko a headache

ANNE WANKO would like a prescription for a headache that seems to occur everytime the phone rings.

Miss Wanko, a nurse, who lives in San Francisco, is being mistaken for former Chicago physician Dr. Anne Marie Wanko, who was among several physicians once investigated by the Illinois attorney general's office for writing large numbers of prescriptions for welfare patients.

Dr. Wanko also has been convicted for deceptive practices and passing bad checks. She also has an unlisted home telemone number.

"I've received hundreds of phone calls during the past few years from creditors looking for Dr. Wanko," said the distressed Miss Wanko.

"They are all looking for payment on bad checks. She apparently doesn't ring up large unpaid bills she just doesn't have money to cover the checks." she added.

"AND, QUITE frankly, it's embarrassing to be mistaken for someone with such a reputation," Miss Wanko said.

Dr. Wanko, 57, once had desk space in a drugstore at 17 S. Halsted St.,

which did a booming business in welfare prescriptions. In 1973, the pharmacy filled \$700,000 worth. Dr. Wanko, whose arrest record dates to 1963, with two convictions, also submitted \$37,000 in medical bills to the welfare department in 1973.

An investigation was ordered by the Cook County department of Public Aid in 1974, then dropped. Dr. Wanko denied responsibility for the expensive double prescription orders, and blamed the pharmacists who filled them.

Dr. Wanko, who received her M.D. from the University of Vienna in No-

vember, 1944; as a citizen of Austria, emigrated to the United States in the mid-1950s.

THE OWNER of the drugstore, Robert Field, has a long arrest record. Field's partner, Allen Ziperstein, 61, was shot to death in the store at 738 W. Madison St. on Aug. 23, 1974.

The California Board of Medical Quality Assurance denied Wanko a medical license because of a lack of medical training, according to Carlton Clark, special investigator for the State of California Consumer Affairs Department.

"I have been working overtime try-

ing to clear up Dr. Wanko's problem of returned checks, etc.," he said. "But I haven't had much luck getting cooperation from her."

Neither is Anne Wanko. "At one point, I got so frustrated that I got her phone number from an investigator and I called her up to tell her what was happening to me," Miss Wanko said.

"Taxicab drivers, whom she hadn't paid, and irate florists were even calling me. So I told her and she eplied very snippily, "Thanks, but I'm getting all the phone calls I vant.' Then she hung up."

State refuses request to investigate 2 drugstores' welfare prescriptions

By George Bliss

THE DRUGSTORES at 17 N. Halsted St. and 738 W. Madison St. don't look like thriving businesses.

They seem cramped, dark, dilapidated, and dirty.

But the stores, both owned by the same man, received more than \$700,000 in government money last year for filling welfare prescriptions. This places them among the top welfare drug stores in Illinois.

Yet a young public aid employe said his superiors rejected a request for a full-scale investigation after irregularities were found in the bills submitted to the state by these stores.

MICHAEL STEIN of the Cook County welfare office said Illinois Department of Public Aid officials told him the two stores had already been cut off from welfare business.

Records show the stores are still billing the state for welfare prescriptions.

Many prescriptions were written by Dr. Anne Marie Wanko and other physicians who have desk space inside the 17 N. Halsted address and only a few steps from the 738 W. Madison store just around the corner.

Dr. Wanko, a grandmotherly looking woman of 54, has an arrest record dating back to 1963—with two convictions—charging such offenses as deceptive practices and passing bad checks.

Her record and the \$37,000 in medical bills she submitted to the welfare department in 1973 aroused so much suspicion earlier this year that welfare investigators placed her under constant surveillance.

IT WAS learned that the surveillance was abruptly lifted by the department, with no explanation given to the investigators.


The owner of the stores is Robert Field, who also has a long arrest record—but no convictions—charging such offenses as receiving stolen goods, battery, pandering, and writing bad checks.

Field's late partner, Allen Ziperstein, 61, was shot to death in the Madison Street store Aug. 23 by an unidentified gunman who asked for him by name and then opened fire—the format of an underworld killing.

Stein, a records analyst and medical social worker for the welfare department, thought that some of the prescriptions he saw for aid recipients seemed to be for questionable materials in unnecessary quantities:

He made no charges of welfare fraud because the department refused to undertake an investigation to prove the charges, he says.

But in the process of urging an inquiry Stein submitted extensive records of bills and took statements—one under

oath—from welfare recipients stating that they did not receive all the materials for which the state was billed.

STEIN SUBMITTED his request for an investigation on June 19, backed it with records gathered on his own on July 26, and added the statements from the aid recipients on July 30.

He said that to the best of his knowledge the welfare department has ignored all this.

Field said he was never questioned about bills by the department.

Records submitted by Stein show that between Nov. 15, 1973, and Jan. 18, 1974, the drug stores filled prescriptions for one welfare recipiont totalling \$77.13 for three heating pads and four pairs of support stockings, all durable items that should have lasted a long time.

The records show that on Nov. 15 the stores filled a prescription by <u>Dr. Wanko for a \$12.45</u> heating pad and one by another doctor—written for the same patient—for two pairs of \$19.90 support stockings.

ON DEC. 17 the stores filled Wanko prescriptions for another heating pad and two more pairs of stockings, and on Jan. 28 yet another prescription for a heating pad—all for the same welfare patient.

In a sworn statement the welfare recipient said, "I have received only two heating pads, not three. I also certify that during that same period I was issued two or three pairs of support hose.

"The hose were issued one pair at a time, never two pairs at a time, as the pharmacy alleges."

Another welfare recipient said he never received two or more pairs of support stockings at one time. Records show the stores informed the state that prescriptions in that aid recipient's name were filled Nov. 12 for four pairs of such stockings—two pairs on a Wanko prescription and two more pairs on a prescription by a doctor whose signature is unreadable.

Each pair of stockings cost the state \$19.90 for a total of \$79.60.

IN ALL, prescriptions for 10 pairs of such stockings for this one aid recipient were charged to the state by the two stores between Nov. 12 and Feb. 7.

Other records show that on Nov. 5 the stores billed the state \$40 for two prescriptions written by Dr. Wanko on behalf of one aid recipient for a powerful tranquilizer called Sinequan. Each prescription cost \$20.

Dr. Wanko, who said she was educated in Vienna, Austria, denied responsibility for the expensive double orders and blamed the pharmacists who filled the prescriptions.

All six drug stores owned by Ziperstein, his son, Eugene, and his partner, Robert Field, specialize in filling prescriptions written by doctors offering government-paid medical care to the poor.

THEY GOT into the business three years ago by buying the small Madison Street store for \$9,000. State-records show that last year their six-store chain was paid well over \$1 million for filling welfare prescriptions.

Two of the stores are among the state's top 12 drug stores doing welfare business, and received more than \$850,000 in state funds last year.

Detectives estimated that one of the stores would have had to fill a prescription every 37 seconds to handle all the business it billed to the state.

In addition, Killackey said Ziperstein operated several medical clinics specializing in welfare patients.

Dr. Mariano Dy, one of the top-paid welfare doctors in Illinois, who received almost \$170,000 from the state last year, works at one of the clinics, Killackey said.

KILLACKEY SAID medical syndicates hire teams of doctors at their clinics and instruct them to write prescriptions for welfare patients whether the drugs are needed or not. Then the prescriptions are filled at syndicate drug stores.

Probe of murder turns to mob-Wedicaid ties

A routine police inquiry into the murder last week of a Near West Side druggist has widened into an investigation of possible crime syndicate involvement in the \$640-million Medicaid program, which supplies medical care to the poor.

The investigation centers on the partner of slain druggist Allen Ziperstein, 61, of 8809 Golf Rd., Niles, who identified himself to police as Robert Fields, but who also is known as Robert Festenstein.

Festenstein, 47, is a former W. Madison St. pawnbroker whose arrest sheet at police headquarters includes charges of receiving stolen goods, pandering, keeping a gambling house, bogus checks, battery and obstruction of justice, but no known convictions.

Questioned after Ziperstein was murdered Friday in the Haymarket Drugs, 738 W. Madison, Festenstein used only his Robert Fields alias and did not mention his arrest record.

The gangland style in which Ziperstein was sought out by name and executed by a well-dressed gunman, as well as subsequent information linking Festenstein to other crime figures, led to the widening of the investigation.

The Police Intelligence Unit on organized crime, headed by Comr. Walter Murphy, and Lt. Edward Neville's Bomb and Arson Squad have joined the Homicide Unit investigation, headed by Comdr. William McCarthy.

Supt. Wayne Kerstetter of the Illinois Bureau of Investigation also has entered the case as part of a statewide investigation of drugstores and middlemen accused of cheating state-financed Medicaid program by filing inflated bill claims.

Ziperstein and Festenstein together owned black. One investigator said the six drugstores, said Robert Ziperstein, the slain druggist's son. All were in poverty operation between the syndic pockets of the city.

Another son, Eugene, reportedly owns 13 other drugstores in the city, and gave financial backing to another store that was forced to close several years ago when a bomb was tossed through the front window, Robert Ziperstein said.

Eugene Ziperstein did say, however, that his father's business started as a joint venture with Festenstein because of the father's friendship with Festenstein's late father. Allen Ziperstein was in the storm-window business when Festenstein suggested to him that they buy the store, Robert Ziperstein said. After they did, the store became so successful they purchased five more, he said.

Robert Ziperstein added that his fatherknew of Festenstein's arrests, but boasted that he had straightened him out for the last five years.

Sources in the multiple investigation point out that a mob push into the drugstore business would not be the first such attempt in Chicago.

In March, 1970, police uncovered a plan by crime syndicate figure Morris Lasky and two leaders of the Black P Stone Nation street gang to take over a Kenwood community drugstore.

As investigators began investigating the crime syndicate angle, they also noted that the Ziperstein case departed from typical gangland killings in one main respect; the "hit man" was described by witnesses as a black. One investigator said this was unprecedented, but fita recent pattern of greater cooperation between the syndicate and minority-group street gangs.



SUBJECT: Your NYC 50/40.378; August 10, 1973; Lists of Reported Nazi War

Criminals Residing in the United States

This refers to your memorandum of August 10, 1973 and attachment dated August 8, 1973, indicating that productive results may not be achieved in a number of the cases under consideration, because of certain factors which could prevent the deportation of the subjects of investigation; and you requested guidelines before proceeding further.

Advanced age, inability to effect deportation and lack of extradition treaties are definite factors to be considered in deciding the extent of action to be taken in these cases. However, such factors alone should not be the sole basis for a decision not to conduct complete investigations. Each case will have to be considered on its own merits and, in addition to advanced age and the deportation and extradition possibilities, all other pertinent factors must be taken into account.

It is not feasible to set up criteria under which we could automatically eliminate any of these cases from further consideration and possible investigation. All cases will have to undergo close scrutiny, initial screening and preliminary inquiries. Then, when sufficient basic facts and information are gathered, recommendations can be made, on a case-to-case basis, whether full-scale investigations are in order.

It is suggested that you conduct your processing of the alleged Nazi war criminal cases by first separating those cases identified with Service records and those cases not identified to date.

Regarding those cases which have been identified, you should obtain all relating files and information available; make appropriate security and agency checks; and conduct preliminary inquiries to establish the current location of the subjects and their present status. Then a complete review should be made in each case to determine if there is any basis for further Service action. Consideration should be given to all factors in each case, including the age of the subject, the possibilities of deportation and extradition, whether the allegations made were previously investigated or considered, etc. An initial M. Warmen -



report should then be submitted in each case setting out all the facts and containing your recommendations whether further investigation should be conducted, or that further Service action is not warranted.

In connection with those cases in which no record has been found to date, your office should forward appropriate record checks and necessary leads in order to locate, identify and establish the present status of these subjects. If necessary, you should contact the sources who submitted the lists of alleged Nazi war criminals in order to obtain all available information. Then a complete review should be made in each case to determine if there is any basis for Service action, as suggested in the preceding paragraph, and an initial report submitted with your recommendations whether further investigation should be conducted.

Please continue to give this matter high priority and conduct the investigations as expeditiously as possible.



Eye other medics' ties to 2 slayings

By George Bliss

INVESTIGATIONS were under way Monday to determine whether other doctors were involved in the contract for the killing of two West Side drugstore owners.

Dr. Max M. Kaye, 65, a retired dentist, has been charged with hiring two men to kill Robert Fields, 47, and Allen Ziperstein, 61, owners of drugstores and medical clinics with extensive welfare business. Investigators do not believe he was acting alone.

Tho a personal feud between

Kaye and Fields was cited as a probable motive for the killings, some investigators said a battle over huge profits from welfare business could be the real cause.

Kaye, of 6301 N. Sheridan Rd., was indicted by the county grand jury Friday on charges of murder and soliciting to commit murder. Two men who allegedly received \$25,000 from Kaye for the killings were arrested and charged with murder earlier.

KAYE, WHO had been vacationing in Florida, surrendered






said he saw him leave the scene of the Fields shooting.

Numerous apparent irregularities in treatment of welfage patients were uncovered as part of police efforts to apprehend the druggists' killers, Deputy Supt. of Police John Killackey said.

INVESTIGATIONS by The Tribune, state probers, and police revealed that:

- Doctors hired by clinics being investigated were encouraged to write prescriptions for over-the-counter drugs and other items not needed by patients.
- The state made public aid medical payments to a clinic

for hundreds of patients supposedly seen by a doctor who admitted he never saw any of them.

On Tuesday, it was revealed that Ziperstein boasted to associates last May that he had collected \$10 million a year in state Medicaid payments in 1973 and hoped to make even more in 1974.

Altho the state never confirmed the \$10 million figure, authorities said they believed a battle over the vast sums reaped by the medical chain owned by Ziperstein and Fields led to their murders. In addition to drugstores, the two also owned medical centers on the South and West Sides.

NEW EVIDENCE of widehas been uncovered by two billed. state agencies working independently.

Druggist shot near store dies; doctors probed

By George Bliss and William Griffin

A WEST SIDE druggist died Sunday night in Cook County Hospital of gunshot wounds as police investigated reports that a "hit man" hired by a group of doctors killed him and his partner.

Robert Fields, 47, of 1314 Monroe St., Evanston, died less than five months after his partner was also gunned down outside the drugstore they owned at 738 W. Madison St.

Chicago Police were investigating reports that a "hit man" also killed Fields' partner, Albert Ziperstein, 61, last Aug. 23.

A group of physicians, whose patients are mostly persons receiving public aid, allegedly ordered the shootings to destroy medical syndicates composed of druggists, clinic owners, and foreign doctors, according to police.

THE MEDICAL syndicates reportedly were formed to exploit the state's \$1.6 billion public aid program by paying doctors to prescribe huge amounts of drugs and tests for welfare patients.

Investigators uncovered the alleged doctors' role in the murders while investigating Ziperstein's death. He was shot seven times inside Haymarket Drugs on Markon Street.

Fields, was shot and critically wounded Saturday outside the drugstore. A gunman shot him once in the abdomen and then fled toward the Loop in a taxi that had been parked in a nearby lot.

Homicide investigators said in both shootings the gunman knew his victims. There were no attempts to rob them and nothing said to them before the shootings.

FIELDS, WHO purchased drugs for the six stores owned by him and Ziperstein's son, Eugene, formerly operated a pawn shop at 820 W. Madison St.

He had a long arrest record
— but no convictions — under
the name of Robert Festenstein. Altho the authorities
called him Fields, the telephone directory and other
sources spelled his named
Field.

Shortly after Ziperstein's murder, Fields told a Tribune reporter that crime syndicate hoodlums showed an interest in becoming partners with members of the medical syndicates. He denied any connection with the hoodlums.

Fields told a reporter he wanted to sell his chain of stores to a factoring company—a medical billing company,

4 suspected in hiring of 2 to kill druggist

Four persons, including a physician, are prime suspects in the hiring of killers to murder two partners in a chain of drug stores and medical centers.

Police said the contract money was believed paid by four business rivals who were angered by the partners' financial successes.

"There is much, much more work to be done in this case by our men in co-operation with the state's attorney's office before more arrests can be effected," said Joseph DiLeonardi, citywide homicide commander.

Two men, arrested Wednesday, have been charged with the murders of Albert Ziperstein, 61, and his partner Robert Fields, 47, who operated two drugstores in a building at Halsted and Madison Sts.

Ziperstein was killed last Aug. 23 by a gunman who walked into Haymarket Drugs, 738 W. Madison, asked for Ziperstein by name and gunned him down. There was no robbery attempt.

Fields was slain by a shotgun blast last Saturday as he walked toward the drugstore.

WILLIAM R. HILL, 26, of 3522 W. Carroll Av., a security guard, and Roosevelt Thomas, 20, of the same address have been charged with the murders.

investigator James E.' Dvorak said the two men may have been paid as much as \$25,000 to kill the druggists.

Hill has bragged he was paid \$10,000 for killing Fields and has made an oral confession in that murder, Dvorak said. Thomas has given a written statement naming Hill as the killer in both cases, police said.

"Thomas related facts about the killings that only someone involved would have known so we feel he was there," Dvorak said.

Dvorak and his partner, Michael Caccitolo, were praised Friday for their investigation of the case by Police Supt. James M. Rochford; John E. Killackey, a deputy superintendent, and DiLeonardi.

MEANWHILE, The Daily News learned that the Cook County Department of Public A i d had initiated an investigation of Haymarket Drugs and a companion store, Halsted Drugs, housed in the same building at 19 N. Halsted around the corner from the Madison St. address used by Haymarket.

Public aid officials refused to comment on that investigation but The Daily News has obtained copies of interoffice memos requesting an investigation of the Ziperstein-'Field drugstores for a "pattern" of irregularities in filling prescriptions for welfare recipients.

A m o n g the irregularities cited was the apparent "excessive" writing of prescriptions by two doctors allegedly connected with Ziperstein and Fields.

Those two doctors, the memo said, wrote hundreds of dollars worth of prescriptions for the same four or five welfare clients during a three-month period in late 1973 and early 1974.

One memo, citing a pattern of abuses, noted that one of the doctors in question wrote two prescriptions on the same day for 90 tablets each of a psychotherpeutic drug for the same welfare patient. Both prescriptions were filled that day by Halsted Drugs.



WASHINGTON-A federal drug enforcement officer has been linked by Sen. Lowell Weicker [R., Conn.] to a bizatre catalog of "assassination equipment" intended for sale to United States government agencies for use abroad.

The drug agent is Lucien Conein, a former Central Intelligence Agency member and friend of E. Howard Hunt. He acknowledged being shown the catalog but denies having a hand in the development of the devices or buying any of the booby traps-including explosive cigaret boxes and telephones-for the drug enforcement agency, an arm of the Justice Department.

The story as developed by Weicker includes the widow of a former wiretapper-whose B. R. Fox Co. issued the catalog-and a former World War II agent for the Office of Strategic Services and arms manufacturer who declined to say whether he does business with the CIA.

I have had the following excludable clauses explained to me and state that I am not, except as hereinafter noted, a member of any one of the following classes of individuals excluded from the United States under the Immigration and Nationality Act: (1) persons who have had one or more attacks of insanity; (2) persons who are narcotic drug addicts or chronic alcoholics; (3) persons who are afflicted with tuberculosis in any form, leprosy, or any dangerous contagious disease; (4) persons afflicted with any other disease, physical defect or disability which is of such a nature as may affect such persons' ability to earn a living unless affirmatively established that they will not have to earn a living; (5) paupers, professional beggars or vagrants; (6) persons convicted of, or who have admitted committing, a crime involving moral turpitude, or committing acts constituting the essential elements of such a crime, with the exceptions noted in the Act; (7) persons convicted of two or more offenses for which the aggregate sentences to confinement actually imposed were 5 years or more; (8) polygamists, practitioners or advocates of polygamy; (9) prostitutes, persons who have engaged in prostitution, persons coming to the United States solely, principally or incidentally to engage in prostitution, procurers and persons attempting to procure, or persons who have procured or attempted to procure or import, prostitutes or persons for the purpose of prostitution or for any other immoral purpose, or persons who are or have been supported by or receive or have received the proceeds of prostitution, or persons coming to the United States to engage in any other unlawful commercialized vice; (10) persons coming to the United States to engage in any immoral sexual act; (11) persons coming to the United States to perform skilled or unskilled labor who do not meet the requirements of the Act; (12) persons likely to become public charges; (13) persons excluded from admission and deported, or persons arrested and deported, or persons fallen into distress and removed, or persons removed as enemy aliens, or persons removed at Government expense, who do not have the Attorney General's permission to reapply for admission; (14) stowaways; persons procuring, or who have sought to procure, visas or other documentation, or who seek to enter the United States by fraud or willful misrepresentation of a material fact; (15) immigrants not possessing valid unexpired immigrant visas, reentry permits, border crossing identification cards or other documentation required by the Act, and a valid unexpired passport or other suitable travel document or document of identity and nationality; (16) quota immigrants possessing visas not issued in compliance with the quota provisions of the Act; (17) persons ineligible to citizenship of the United States, or persons who have departed from or have remained outside the United States to evade or avoid military training or service in time of war or national emergency; (18) persons convicted of a violation of any law or regulation relating to the illicit narcotics drug traffic or of any law or regulation governing commerce or manufacture of narcotic drugs as provided in the Act; (19) persons who seek admission from foreign contiguous territory or adjacent islands after arriving therein by nonsignatory or noncomplying transportation lines; (20) persons seeking to enter the United States solely, principally, or incidentally to engage in activities which would be prejudicial to the public interest, or endanger the welfare, safety, or security of the United States; (21) persons who are, or at any time have been, anarchists, Communists, or other political subversives, as specified in Sec. 212 (a) (28) of the Act; (22) persons who after entering the United States probably would engage in activities prohibited by the laws of the United States relating to espionage, sabotage, public disorder, or in any other activity subversive to the national security, or engage in any activity a purpose of which is opposition to, control or overthrow of, the United States Government by force, violence or other unconstitutional means, or join, affiliate with, or participate in the activities of any organization registered or required to be registered under Sec. 7 of the Subversive Activities Control Act of 1950; (23) persons accompanying other persons ordered excluded, deported, and certified to be helpless from sickness or mental or physical disability or infancy pursuant to Sec. 237 (e) of the Act, whose protection or guardianship is required by the persons excluded and deported; (24) persons who at any time, knowingly and for gain, encouraged, induced, assisted, abetted, or aided any other alien to enter or try to enter the United States in violation of law.
