Alert



On August 26, 2024, the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Texas, in *Texas v. Department of Homeland Security,* Case Number 24-cv-306 administratively stayed DHS from granting parole in place under Keeping Families Together for 14 days; the District Court might extend the period of this administrative stay.

Alert (continued)



While the administrative stay is in place, we will:

- Not grant any pending parole in place requests under Keeping Families Together.
- Continue to accept filings of Form I-131F, Application for Parole in Place for Certain Noncitizen Spouses and Stepchildren of U.S. Citizens.
- While the administrative stay order is in place, USCIS will continue to schedule biometric appointments and capture biometrics at Application Support Centers.

The District Court's administrative stay order does not affect any applications that were approved before the administrative stay order was issued.

Biometric Appointments



USCIS continues to schedule biometric appointments consistent with the administrative stay order issued by the district court on Aug. 26, 2024. All individuals with biometric appointments should plan to appear at their appointment at the scheduled date, time, and ASC indicated on their notice. Individuals **should not** arrive on a different date, unless they have rescheduled their appointments. Individuals who were turned away at an ASC will have their appointment rescheduled by USCIS.

Biometric Appointments (continued)



As a reminder, individuals must print their biometric appointment notice and bring it with them to their appointment. In addition, if individuals are unable to attend the appointment, they can reschedule using the online rescheduling request process, as long as rescheduling takes place before the initial appointment expires. 




Administrative Stay – August 26, 2024



- DHS administratively stayed from granting parole in place
- 14 days, may be extended
- USCIS continues to accept applications
- Does not affect decisions made before administrative order was issued
- USCIS will continue to schedule biometric appointments at Application Support Centers

Keeping Families Together

ALERT: On August 26, 2024, the United States District Court for the Eastern District of Texas, in Texas v. While the administrative stay is in place, we will:

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- Continue to accept filings of Form I-131F, Application for Parole in Place for Certain Noncitizen Spouses and Stepchildren of U.S. Citizens.

The District Court's administrative stay order does not affect any applications that were approved before the administrative stay order was issued.

ALERT: On Aug. 19, DHS posted for public inspection a Federal Register notice implementing Keeping Families Together, a process for certain noncitizen spouses and stepchildren of U.S. citizens to apply for parole in place. Additional information on the eligibility criteria under this process, the request process, and examples of required documentation are available on this page, the Frequently Asked Questions About Keeping Families Together page, and in the Federal Register notice. We have also created a Filing Guide for Form 1-131F (PDF, 8.95 MB) to help individuals as they prepare to file a request for parole in place through the online process.

On June 18, 2024, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced a key step toward fulfilling President Biden's commitment to promoting family unity in the immigration system. On Aug. 19, 2024, DHS implemented Keeping Families Together, a process for certain noncitizen spouses and noncitizen stepchildren of U.S. citizens to request parole in place under existing statutory authority.


Parole is an exercise of DHS's discretionary authority under section 212(d)(5)(A) of the Immigration and Nationality Act (INA) to allow certain noncitizen "applicants for admission" to be present in the United States on a temporary, case-by-case basis for urgent humanitarian reasons or significant public benefit. The INA defines an "applicant for admission," in relevant part, as a noncitizen "present in the United States who has not been admitted." Noncitizens who are present in the United States without admission or parole may be considered for parole in place under this process because they remain "applicants for admission." Parole in place is available only for noncitizens who are present in the United States.

If granted parole, and if otherwise eligible, these noncitizens may apply for adjustment of status to that of a lawful permanent resident without being required to leave the United States and be processed by a U.S. consulate overseas. DHS estimates that 500,000 noncitizen spouses of U.S. citizens could be eligible to access Keeping Families Together; on average, these noncitizens have resided in the United States for 23 years. In addition, approximately 50,000 noncitizen stepchildren of U.S. citizens are estimated to be eligible to seek parole under Keeping Families Together.

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Step 1—Add a client






Step 2—Select the client

Form I-131F has four sections.



Choose the type of request:

- Spouse of U.S. citizen OR
- Stepchild of U.S. citizen


If request is for stepchild of U.S. citizen

- Stepchild does not have to wait for their parent to file
- Stepchild can apply even if their parent does not apply
- BUT...if their parent applies first, include the parent's receipt number on the stepchild's form

You must complete all fields with an asterisk (*) to submit this form. I am requesting parole in place under INA section 212(d)(5)(A) under the Process to Promote the Unity and Stability of Families as the: * Spouse of a United States Citizen Stepchild of a United States Citizen What is your parent's I-131F receipt number? - A written narrative is required.
- Provide information from your client about why they qualify for a discretionary grant of parole.



You must complete all fields with an asterisk (*) to submit this form.

Explain how you qualify for parole in place, including information regarding the significant public benefit or urgent humanitarian reasons warranting a grant of parole, and why you believe you merit a favorable exercise of discretion.

You must explain how you qualify for parole in place as a noncitizen spouse or stepchild of a U.S. citizen in the space provided, including any specific factors that support your request or may be considered in overcoming a rebuttable presumption of ineligibility. Include copies of any supporting documents or evidence you wish considered. USCIS will use the information provided in your parole request and supporting evidence, along with the results of background and security checks and any other relevant information available to or requested by USCIS, to determine whether parole is warranted based on a significant public benefit or urgent humanitarian reasons and whether you merit a favorable exercise of discretion.

Provide an explanation. Your answer must be at least 750 characters. *

In this section, you need to provide a written narrative for why the applicant deserves a favorable exercise of discretion. This is where they tell their story. This section must have at least 750 characters (not words.) If it doesn't it will generate a red alert.


- Accepted file formats: JPG, JPEG, PDF, TIF or TIFF
- No encrypted or password-protected files
- If your documents are in a foreign language, upload a full English translation and the translator's certification with each original document.
- Upload no more than five documents at a time

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Step 5—Complete Form G-28

Give this passcode to your client to initiate the G-28 client relationship

Your client will need to enter this one-time passcode on his or her account homepage in order to add you as a representative. Your client must have a USCIS online account in order for you to manage his or her case online.

If this code is not used within 30 days, it will expire and the draft G-28 will be deleted.





 - Long vertical view





- If client accepts both, legal representative will pay and submit
- If client declines either form, legal representative will make edits and send representative passcode to client again.



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Step 3—Client signs forms

Client indicates if they want notices and/or documents sent to legal representative

Client signs by typing their name



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


