# Process Overview



- In June, the Department of Homeland Security (DHS) announced a key step toward fulfilling President Biden’s commitment to promote family unity in the immigration system.
- DHS established a process to consider, on a case-by-case basis, requests for parole in place from certain noncitizen spouses and stepchildren of U.S. citizens who meet certain criteria and demonstrate that they merit a favorable exercise of discretion.
- On Aug. 19, 2024, DHS posted for public inspection a Federal Register notice implementing the Keeping Families Together process for certain noncitizen spouses and stepchildren of U.S. citizens.
- USCIS started accepting requests on Monday, Aug. 19.

# Criteria for Spouses of U.S. Citizens



U.S. Citizenship

To be considered for parole in place under this process on a case-by-case basis for up to a three-year period, a noncitizen spouse of a U.S. citizen must:

- Be present in the United States without admission or parole;
- Have 10 years of continuous physical presence in the U.S. as of June 17, 2024 (in other words, since at least June 17, 2014);
- Have a legally valid marriage to a U.S. citizen as of June 17, 2024;
- Have no disqualifying criminal history;
- Not pose a threat to public safety, national security, or border security; and
- Merit a discretionary grant of parole in place for significant public benefit or urgent humanitarian reasons.



# Criteria for Stepchildren of U.S. Citizens

We may also consider certain noncitizen stepchildren (unmarried and under 21 as of June 17, 2024) of a U.S. citizen under this process if they:

- Are present in the United States without admission or parole;
- Have been continuously physically present since at least June 17, 2024;
- Have a parent who entered a legally valid marriage with a U.S. citizen on or before June 17, 2024, and before the child's 18th birthday;
- Have no disqualifying criminal history.
- Do not pose a threat to public safety or national security; and
- Merit a discretionary grant of parole in place for significant public benefit or urgent humanitarian reasons.

# Criminal History and Eligibility



- Disqualifying criminal history includes convictions for certain offenses, including all felonies, and offenses involving firearms, domestic violence, sexual abuse or exploitation, and most drug offenses, among others, regardless of whether the offense is classified as a felony.
- Pending criminal charges will also make an individual ineligible for this process until those charges are resolved.
- Any other criminal convictions, excluding minor traffic offenses, will result in a presumption of ineligibility for parole in place under this process. To overcome the presumption of ineligibility, you must provide documentation demonstrating positive factors that can be considered in overcoming this presumption and showing that you warrant a favorable exercise of discretion.

# Process and Fees



- To be considered for parole in place, an individual must submit the new Form I-131F (Application for Parole in Place for Certain Noncitizen Spouses and Stepchildren of U.S. Citizens), provide supporting documents, and pay a \$580 fee to USCIS. This is only an online process. Any Forms I-131F that are mailed to USCIS will be rejected.
- There is no fee waiver available for the Form I-131F.
- We will determine on a case-by-case basis if the requestor has demonstrated that:
  - A grant of parole is warranted based on significant public benefit or urgent humanitarian reasons, and
  - They merit a favorable exercise of discretion in the totality of the circumstances.
- We will consider every requestor's immigration history, criminal history, the results of background checks and national security and public safety vetting, and any other relevant information available to or requested by USCIS.

# Employment Authorization Document



U.S. Citizenship

- Individuals will not be able to simultaneously request employment authorization with the Form I-131F.
- If granted parole in place, parolees may file Form I-765, Application for Employment Authorization, through their USCIS online account to request an Employment Authorization Document based on being in a current period of parole (category (c)(11)).
- If you want to request a fee waiver, you must file Form I-765 and the fee waiver request on paper.

# Gather Documentation



## Organize your evidence:

- Proof of identity, including expired documents if provided with additional documentation (birth certificate with photo identification, valid driver's license, valid passport);
- Proof of your or your noncitizen parent's legally valid marriage to a U.S. citizen as of June 17, 2024 (marriage certificate);
- Proof of termination of all prior marriages (divorce decrees, death certificates, annulment documents);
- Documents that establish you have been continuously physically present in the U.S. for the required period;
- Proof your spouse or stepparent is a U.S. citizen;
- Arrest records and court dispositions for any arrests, charges or convictions; and
- Evidence of additional factors you would like USCIS to consider in the exercise of discretion.
- Stepchildren must also include evidence of your relationship with your noncitizen parent (birth certificate or adoption decree).

**IMPORTANT: Documents containing foreign language must be accompanied by a full English translation.**

# Gather Documentation (cont.)



## Organize your evidence to prove continuous physical presence.

- Requirement for spouses of U.S. citizens is since June 17, 2014, through the date of filing your request.
- Requirements for stepchildren of U.S. citizens is since June 17, 2024, through the date of filing your request.
- A few examples are:
  - Rent receipts or utility bills
  - School records
  - Hospital/medical records
  - Birth certificates
  - Dated bank transactions
  - Deeds, mortgages, rental agreements
  - Tax returns or tax transcripts
